Mini Musicians Comparison Group Schools

Every child should experience joy, find their voice and flourish as a young musician at school.

Title of research project: Mini Musicians

Overview

Merton Music Foundation is working with The London Borough of Merton, Sing Up and The University of Roehampton to deliver 'Mini Musicians', an Early Years and Key Stage 1 music programme for Merton schoolchildren. The programme is being delivered in ten schools across the borough and its impact is being studied by The University of Roehampton, researchers hope to demonstrate a correlation between pupils' musical progress and their wider academic attainment.

Your child's school has agreed to participate as part of the 'comparison group' for the research study. Researchers need access to data from pupils that aren't participating in the Mini Musicians programme in order analyse its effectiveness.

These organisations require your consent for several purposes:

- 1. to access your child/children's personal data,
- 2. to take video/audio recordings of your child/children at school to support the research study.
- 3. to allow the organisations to use photographs and audios/videos taken as part of the project of your child/children to communicate the work of the programme and share the findings of the research.

This form contains the full details of the project.

Project Description

Mini Musicians is a pilot programme for The London Borough of Merton in partnership with Merton Music Foundation, Sing Up and The University of Roehampton. The programme will run from January 2024 to July 2025 in ten Merton Primary schools, reaching over 600 children. Pupils in Pilot Schools will participate in weekly music sessions and learn to play the melodica (a type of keyboard instrument). At the end of the programme, pupils will be entered for a nationally recognised music accreditation and participate in a Key Stage 1 music festival.

Your child's school has agreed to be part of the Comparison Group. Your child's class won't participate directly in the Mini Musicians programme of activity, but pupils will participate in other assessment activities to support the findings of the Study. Engaging in this study will hopefully make a positive impact to music education at schools. We aim to highlight how music programs such as this, can create lasting benefits. Plus, your child's school will enjoy a special performance by Professor Adam Ockelford and Derek Paravicini, a blind autistic musician.

What Does the Study Involve?

Comparison Group pupils will participate in a short musical assessment at the start and end of the project. This will involve clapping rhythms and singing in response to a video stimulus. These assessments will be carried out by a professional music educator in an engaging and child-centred way. Assessment data will be shared with your child's school and made available to you, should you request this.

Why We Need Your Consent

In order to complete the study, The University of Roehampton requires access to your child's personal information and attainment data as well as video observations of the music assessments for research purposes.

We are also asking separately for your consent to allow the use audio/video recordings made of your child during the assessments for communication purposes once the programme has ended (your child's face will be blurred and their name removed in any materials that are shared for this purpose).

How Data Will Be Stored and Used

Photographs and video/audio recordings will be made on secure designated devices. Data will then be securely transferred to Merton Music Foundation's servers and deleted from the devices once assessment has taken place.

Your child's personal data will pseudonymised, meaning that the child's identifying personal details such as their name will be removed from the dataset. A separate 'key' will be maintained to allow researchers to match children's data with video/audio observations to enable comparisons to be made between children's musical progress and wider academic attainment. These pseudonymised video and audio recordings (with faces blurred and names removed) may also be used by the researchers when communicating their research findings at conferences, in academic journals and in practitioner journals, on social media and via their website. These materials will bear no reference to a participant's name and their faces will be blurred.

What Data Will Be Collected?

Personal Information: child's age, gender, ethnicity, Free School Meal status, whether they speak English as an additional language, attendance data, and if they are entitled to Pupil Premium Grant funding.

Attainment data: Early Years Foundation Stage Profile results, End of Year 1 Phonics Screening Test results, end of Year 2 standardised test results, attendance data and ongoing teacher assessments in Literacy, Mathematics and other subjects, including teacher observations about pupils' oracy (speech) development.

Data Retention

Pseudonymised pupil data and audios/videos gathered for the purpose of the research study will be retained by The University of Roehampton for a period of 10 years after the end of the project and then will be permanently deleted or fully anonymised. This completed consent form will be held for a period of 6 years after the end of the project and then destroyed.

Research Findings

The findings of this research may be published in academic journals, shared with Merton schools, publicised online via Merton Music Foundation, The University of Roehampton, Merton Council and Sing Up websites and presented at conferences, such as the Music Mark Conference.

DATA PRIVACY NOTICE FOR RESEARCH PARTICIPANTS

Research Participants - How the University of Roehampton uses your personal data

Why have I been directed here or been given this form?

This statement explains how The University of Roehampton handles and uses personal data collected from research participants. This includes data collected directly from research participants or where the data has been received from a third party.

Who will process my personal data?

This statement applies to all research conducted by The University of Roehampton and its members.

What is the purpose of the personal data processing?

You will have been informed about the specific types of personal data that will be used in connection with the research project you are participating in, and the nature and purpose of the research project. You will have been informed of any data sharing with participating research institutions, transfers outside of the European Union, and any automated decision making that affects you.

In some cases, your data may have been shared with the University by another organisation for the purposes of conducting research. The University may also re-use personal data it already holds for the purposes of conducting new research. The University will only use personal data in this way where it is legally entitled to do so. In all cases, the University will normally contact you to give you details of the research unless this would be impossible or involve disproportionate effort, or would significantly undermine the research objectives.

The University may in exceptional circumstances release personal data to appropriate authorities without seeking the permission of or notifying the data subject, but will only do so in compliance with its legal obligations.

What is the legal basis of the processing?

In the majority of cases, your personal data (including, where appropriate, sensitive personal data) is used to carry out research, including scientific, historical and statistical research, in the public interest. Where the research is commercial in nature or funded by a private company, the legal basis for processing is likely to be legitimate interests. If the personal data being used for research purposes falls into one of the special categories of personal data, including criminal convictions data, the lawful basis will usually be that the processing is necessary for archiving purposes in the public interest, scientific or historical research purposes.

What are my rights as a data subject?

The General Data Protection Regulation and Data Protection Act 2018 provide exemptions for personal data processing in relation to research activities.

You have the right to opt-out of any further processing. If you do opt-out, your personal data may not be erased but will only be used in an anonymised form as part of the dataset. (Please note that this is separate to withdrawing your participation from the research project itself).

In accordance with accepted ethical standards, you will not be named in any published materials unless you have given your explicit permission for this to happen.

The University considers that other statutory rights held by personal data subjects do not apply where the personal data is being processed for the purposes of research. If you would like to request a copy of the personal data then you can contact the lead researcher. Where practicable, they will provide you with a copy of this data. However, they are under no obligation to do so.

How long is my information kept for?

Your data will be kept in accordance with The University of Roehampton's <u>Record Retention Schedule</u>. Research data may be retained indefinitely in an anonymised form by researchers. The University may also reuse your personal data for a different research project. If it does, the University will make reasonable attempts to inform you about this reuse and its impact on your rights as a data subject.

Occasionally a researcher will leave the University and begin working for another organisation. In this case, your personal data may be transferred to the new organisation so that the research project can continue. If this happens, you should be provided with updated privacy information by the new organisation.

The University is committed to protecting all personal data for which it acts as a controller. Your information will be safely held on a secure system.

Who can I contact?
